Having lived and worked in Oklahoma City from the moment I heard the bomb go off at the Murrah Building in 1995 until it was leveled, I lived through a another disaster brought about by hatred. Some say "Well that wasn't as significant as this due to the number killed." Perhaps, but I knew some of those at the bottom of the stack in Oklahoma City. It gets personal when you grieve for someone you know and look into the faces of their friends and relatives daily. I'm sure that some of our members have learned of loved ones, friends and acquaintances that are involved in these attacks. I know no magic words that make the pain go away. Most ring hollow at a time like this and yet it becomes necessary at this time for remembering the positive aspects of their lives and begin the healing process.

On a happier note, several of us were lucky enough to attend the Wallace Gathering at the Fergus (Ontario) Highland Games from August 8-12, 2001. Clan Wallace was honored along with Clan Bruce and Clan Graham. This was the 56th highland games at Fergus, and it is a major North American Scottish event. We were treated royally by the Sponsors of the event. These games are also a major event on the competition circuit. For instance, there were 600 competing in Highland Dance on the Saturday and 300 on the Sunday! Heavy Athletics and Pipes-and-Drums competitions were also very much in evidence. Thanks to Directors Jim (Jamie) Hamilton Wallace and Tom Wallace for all of their hard work organizing this wonderful event.

the Society and to convening. This is great news! We are scarce of convenors in some regions of North America. For the most part, this occurs in areas where the CWS hasn't had convenors to-date or where the established or local convenor has decided to retire.

To this end, our present financial structure requires that the Society continue to recruit new members, especially from regions where we are under-represented. There are many games and festivals today where we do not even have a presence. So again, if you have ever thought about becoming a convenor but haven't yet, please consider it again. Even setting up a Wallace Tent at one game per year will help. With the loan of a convenor kit, the cost is minimal and the rewards are well worth the effort as so many of us already know.

Recruiting new members is critical to the continued financial well being of this organization. As this Society has no annual dues, there is no annual revenue stream as in most other clan societies. Lets each of us make a concerted effort for the rest of the year to recruit as many new members as possible. One thousand CWS members by Spring 2002 is an attainable and realistic goal. In six short years our ranks have swelled from about 300 to our current position of about 800 members. Working together, increasing the membership of the Clan Wallace Society Worldwide to 1000 members in the space of several months will be a fitting testimonial to the hard work and dedication of our members and our convenors to our Clan and our Scottish heritage.

Election Results

Dick, John and Bill will assume their responsibilities on January 1, 2002 and their terms will run until December 31, 2004. Each brings his individual expertise and experience to the Board and their input will be greatly appreciated.

Turning to the bylaws, these were ratified by the Council Membership overwhelmingly. The new Society Bylaws will be printed in their entirety in a subsequent "Gleidhidh."

The Board of Directors have made improved communication one of the Society's key directions. After all, each of us have a vested interest in the Society having each made an investment in the corporation through our membership fees; Lifetime or Council.

The time has come for the Society to make the another leap into the electronic age — electronic distribution of the newsletter and other pertinent communications.

At this writing there are 817 registered mem-

bers of the Society. Of these, 189 have valid email addresses (not taking into account members residing in the same household or sharing email addresses). According to the database, the Society sends hard-copy versions of the newsletter to 467 individuals (these must be printed, folded, placed in envelopes and specially mailed to take advantage of bulk mailing rates). This is proving to be an expensive and unwise use of the Society's already limited resources.

Alistair McIntyre of Electric Scotland is printing chapters of "The Scottish Chiefs" by Jane Porter on his website. Electric Scotland's website www.electricscotland.com.

Dick and Jan Wallace of Marysville, CA, write that the Pleasanton Games "were a knockout with over 50,000 people in attendance." Jan explains that "there were 33 pipe bands plus the Marine Corp Band from San Diego. The bands were from New Zealand, Canada, and many of the 48. At closing ceremonies the massed band was 800 pipers and drummers. There was not a dry eye after Amazing Grace that night. We talked to over 100 Wallaces at the Clan tent and the tent was overflowing both days with people – visitors and members. (there was some beer and single malt, too!) It was nice to see Ed Ries and his wife Elaine and their family there from San Diego. We had great help in the tent thanks to Kay Cayler and Russ, Dan and Laurie Isdell, Chris and Ron Wallace from San Jose, Annette and Cecelia Becker and family. There were 125 clans represented at the games. The weather was perfect with sunny skies in the 90's. What else do you expect in CA??? There was a pub night Thursday. We participated in a Scottish Fashion Show and Luncheon in downtown Pleasanton on Friday. Our assignment was formal evening wear and the red Wallace Tartan." Jan adds, "You should see Richard A. in a tux and ruffles." There were ceilidhs on Friday and Saturday and Sunday nights with games during Saturday and Sunday day.

Tom Wallace of Saint John, NB, convened at the New Brunswick Highland Games & Scottish Festival from July 28th through 30th in Fredericton, the provincial capital, assisted by future member John Cobham. These games are now the largest in Atlantic Canada and were recently recognized by Attractions Canada for excellence. Tom writes "there was a reception at the official residence of the Lieutenant Governor, Her Honour Marilyn Trenholme Counsell, and the who's-who of New Brunswick's Scottish community was in attendance. Following, there was an open-air concert on the front lawn. At the games Saturday and Sunday, Clan Wallace was one of the busier clan tents, with 110 visitors signing the guest book, and five serious membership enquiries. George Wallace of Veazie, ME, stopped by to purchase a Clan Wallace flag. The most interesting visitor at Fredericton was Mr. Arthur Stavinsky, a Japanese national whose father fled Germany in the 1930's. Mr. Stavinsky, born and raised in Tokyo, was quite knowledgeable about William Wallace and shared Japanese impressions of 'Braveheart.' Erik Doucet of Wedgeport, NS, a member of the Royal Canadian Air Force Pipes and Drums and an officer-cadet at the Royal Military College, visited the tent. Erik's mother's family are Wallaces, and Erik is

very interested in convincing the Town of Yarmouth to adopt a local pipe band and to have them wear the Wallace tartan. No doubt, there will be more in the coming months on this subject. One important visitor at Fredericton was Harry MacDonald, the North American Scottish Heavyweight Athletics champion. Tom closes with "local sports organizer Brian Johnson has been trying to recruit me as a heavyweight athlete, but I have enough on my plate as it is."

Speaking of Scottish athletes, Lance Kieran Wallace of Houston, TX, participated at the Arlington Highland Games and Scottish Festival on June 3rd. One of Clan Wallace's most-active Scottish heavyweight athletes, Lance not only won one medal, but three. Lance won bronze in the 22-lb hammer, after which he won bronze in 28-lb weight for distance. Not to be outdone, Lance proceeded to win his first silver medal in the Class B and C caber toss. Unfortunately, Lance was forced to miss competitions in Austin and Houston this summer as underwent surgery in both feet. Lance plans to re-enter competition at the Bedford (Ft. Worth) Highland Games on October 13th and will be providing demonstrations on October 14th. On Friday, the wind howled and rain fell. Saturday, there was six inches of snow on the ground. The Games

went ahead regardless. Sunday was sunny and warm. Elmer Inman of Sandy, UT, co-convened, and Allan wishes to thank him for his dedication to the Society. Allan also wishes to thank Gary and Sarah Wallace of Colorado Springs for assisting dismantling the Wallace tent on Sunday. Many general questions on Scottish and Wallace heritage were answered, and Allan figures that at least 27 members stopped by to sign the guest-book. Jean R. and Dick Wallace of Little Rock, AR, had the honor of being the first Wallaces to convene at the Vancouver (BC) Highland Games. Jean writes, "Pipes, pipes and more pipes. The day was wonderful at the Highlands Games in Coquitlam. Simon Fraser University has a Grade One pipe band that has won the competition in Scotland the last 5 years. They also have several Grade Two pipe bands in the area and many youth pipe bands. It was wonderful to see 30 – 40 young people from the ages of 7 and above in not one, but several pipe bands. The dancers came prepared they brought their own tents to sit under (e-z up's) while waiting to perform. The weather was wonderful,

the high might be in the low 70's, and the location was great. The games are held at the Coquitlam Town Centre, and there is a park with concession stands and covered bleachers facing the games. The mountains are close enough that the sound of the pipes reverberates back to the field. There was a track going around the field and in the center were the vendors and clan tents on one side, open area in the middle and dancing on the other side. The pipe bands and their tents were behind us on the other side of the track and we had the piper competition right behind us. We also had the staging area for the bands right by us. People were very friendly; we were very surprised that there were less than 10 clan tents and that this was the first time anyone remembered a Clan Wallace tent at the games. Clan Wallace was victorious for the sixth time running in the Clan Tug of War at the Heart of Tennessee Scottish Festival, 5-7 October. In fact, Clan Wallace is a charter member clan of the Heart of Tennessee, and has participated in every game since 1996.
