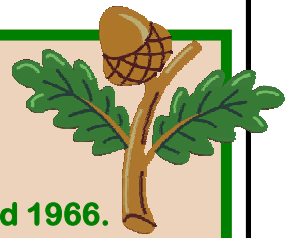

## Annual \$20 Membership Category Ratified

As the result of a Council Members vote during the 2004 election season, the By-laws of the Clan Wallace Society Worldwide are being amended to add an Annual Membership Category. Starting on 01 January 2006, interested individuals may become Annual Members by proper application and contribution of \$20.00 annually to the Society (Note: all amounts quoted are US dollars.

Annual Members will have no vote, may not nominate Directors for election, and may not hold office or serve on the Board of Directors. Annual members shall have all other privileges, rights, and benefits of the Society.

It is anticipated that the addition of the new "Annual Membership Category" will make it more affordable for interested persons to join the Society. However, implementation of this new category will require an adjustment, an increase, in the one-time fee to become a Life Member from \$50.00 to \$175.00. As with Annual Members, Life Members may not nominate Directors for election, vote in the election, or hold office or serve on the Board of Directors in the Society. Life Members may be upgraded to Council Membership for an additional \$175.00.

There will also be an increase in the one-time fee to become a Council Member from \$100.00 to \$350.00. Council members may nominate other Council Members as Directors, vote in the annual elections of Directors and

other matters as expressly provided for in these By-laws, and hold office and serve on the Board of Directors.

To keep faith with the Society's past commitments to its members, all Life and Council Members of CWSW, who hold a valid membership as of 31 December 2005 shall be

"grandfathered" into their current membership categories and shall never be required to pay annual assessments. However, should a "grandfathered" Life Member

desire to become a Council Member after the effective date of the new By-laws, they will be required to apply and to donate the additional \$175.00.

Between now and the effective date of this change (01 January 2006) just might be the perfect time for existing Life Members to upgrade to Council Membership at the current lower rate. Non-members, who are interested in joining but have never made the hard decision to apply, might find this the best opportunity to join and secure a Life or Council Membership at great savings. Life and Council memberships for family members would make great gifts during the 2005 Holiday Season.

## CWS Members Showcase Scottish Culture at Diversity Education

On 11 May 2005 several CWS members had the opportunity to share some of our Celtic Heritage with staff of PREHAB, AZ. PREHAB (Prevention and Rehabilitation) provides assistance to at risk children and families. PREHAB shelters abused women and children. PREHAB schools meet the educational needs of those children.

PREHAB staff asked the Caledonian Society of Arizona if they could participate in staff diversity classes by discussing Scottish culture. Exec VP Bill J. and Norma Wallace of the CWS volunteered to present a class for the PREHAB for Maricopa County, AZ.

Eight staff members came for a two-hour multimedia presentation – discussion, photos, video, displays and a hands-on bodhran lesson. There was

much note taking as Norma and Bill Wallace discussed Scottish history, clan society, the Scots-Irish, religion, sports, famous Wallaces and CWS, and of course the kilt. Norma really enjoyed telling all about the difficulty of training a man to wear a “skirt.” She just can’t get it straight, KILT not skirt. After hearing some Gaelic speakers (on a CD) and some traditional music the group had a good time learning bodhran drumming on pizza boxes following Norma on her bodhran.

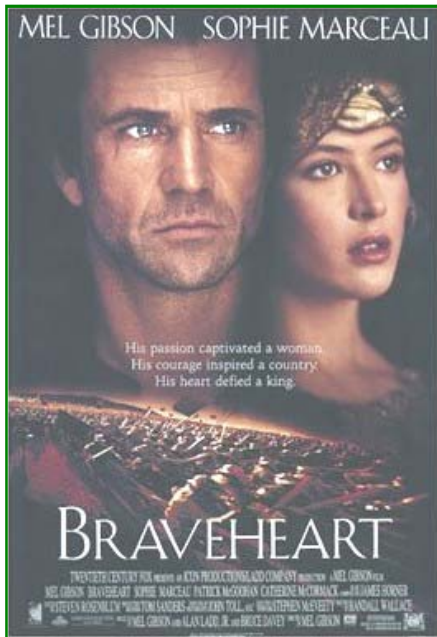

## BH Stars to Reunite for Film's 10th Anniversary



The stars of Hollywood block-buster Braveheart could be reunited in Scotland to celebrate the 700th anniversary of the death of William Wallace.

Mel Gibson, Brian Cox and Sophie Marceau are expected to come together to pay tribute to the Scottish Patriot. They have been invited to attend a special star studded reunion in the market town of Lanark, Scotland, in

September 2005, along with screenplay-writer and author Randall Wallace.

One of the cast members (unnamed) decided to bring the cast and crew together 10 years after the movie first blasted on to the silver screen to coincide with the anniversary celebrations. The stars are expected to join a host of celebrities, including Sean Connery, Russell Crowe and Billy Connolly.

The party will be one of a host of events held in the town, including a two-day battle re-enactment and a living history fair to commemorate the hero. Organizers have invited Gibson and Wallace to spend the weekend at Lee castle, which is owned by US millionaire Addison Fisher.

Frank Gunning, chairman of the William Wallace heritage Trust, said "Ever since we began organizing the Wallace Events, they have been interested in coming.

One of the cast members decided to organize the 10th anniversary cast reunion and has been busy contacting other cast members to get them to come to Lanark in September."

## Book of Wallace On Sale

There are a limited number of these books available in hard cover. They are an excellent reference for a serious researcher of Sir William Wallace "Braveheart". Each copy is bound in a dark red cover, which would make an excellent gift for that someone special on anyone's list.

Each tome contains 730 pages, and is hand-sewn and bound. Originally printed and bound as two volumes with Volume 1 being the genealogy of the main branches of the Wallace families and Volume 2 dealing with the life and events of Sir William Wallace, it is now one volume.

Originally printed in 1889 just prior to the death of Dr. Rogers in only 250 copies and with no more than 150 copies printed since then this is a very unique gift.

The next printing will probably be in paperback or on CD as this project has proven to be expensive. *The Book of Wallace* is \$60 for Clan Wallace Society members (at cost of publication), and US\$75.00 for non-members. ### 27<sup>th</sup> Celtic Festival of Southern Maryland

Convenor Jim Schmelzer informs that Clan Wallace attended "a damp Southern Maryland Games and Celtic Festival. He writes, "The Eastern Mid-Atlantic Scottish Games Season opened the last weekend of April in Southern Maryland with co-convenors Jim Schmelzer and Jim "Bowie" Wallace hosting the Clan Wallace activities for about 10 Society Members who braved the weather and arrived in good spirits. Both Jims report that overall the day went well and all who attended had a great time." More than 50 clans and societies had information to share. "Three performing stages offered continuous music and dance featuring internationally known recording artists and groups. We watched craft and country-dance demonstrations and listened to harp, and Scottish fiddling while storytellers wove tales near grazing sheep alongside historical displays, crafts and food. There was a Celtic market place for foods and gifts provides an old world atmosphere. All-day Competitions included pipers, fiddlers, highland dancers, athletes, drummers, pipe bands and Celtic harpists."

### 24<sup>th</sup> Annual Gatlinburg (TN) Scottish Festival and Games

The kick-off for the activities was the Grand Parade through the center of Gatlinburg on Friday evening followed by a new function, a formal Gala Reception and Dinner at the Ramada Inn-Four Seasons. Saturday and Sunday were filled with traditional activities, including Heavy Athletics and Highland Dance Contests, Pipe Bands with Pipe and Drum Competitions, and two

days of entertainment, ethnic food, and vendors. A ceilidh under the stars was held on Saturday night and Sunday morning began with a Kirkin' on the athletic field. are looking for suggestions on something to use to hang items in your tent, one very inexpensive item is clear shower curtain rings. I got mine at the dollar store, they pack well in the tool box and are easy to get on and off the brace inside the tent. We also have several games where wind is a factor. Another dollar store find are the metal dog run screws. Those work very well helping tie down your tent.

### 8<sup>th</sup> Annual Arizona Highland Celtic Festival

Bill J. Wallace writes that on 09 July 2005, a contingent of CWS members attended a special comparative cultural event. He contributes that "the cultures of the Native Americans and the Scots, at first glance, seem far apart. A pow-wow was held at Camp Verde, AZ, the week before the 8<sup>th</sup> Annual Arizona Highland Celtic Festival where the similarities stood out. Vendors sold Native American wares and jewelry. There were tents set up in a circle around the stadium where the dance contests were held. Drumming contests were also held. At the Grand Entry members of each

tribe entered the stadium in their native dress. A color guard of Native American Veterans presented the colors. Does this all sound familiar? The goal to educate the public about the heritage, language, traditions, art and history of their culture was the same as goal the Celts pursue." At the Flagstaff Games proper (16 July 2005), not only were the similarities of the festivals noted, the combined heritage was embodied in one person. The melding of Native Americans and Scots was evident with Chinnubbie McIntosh, a descendent of the 16th Chief of the Clan MacIntosh and chiefs of the Creek Indian Nation. He stands beside James McBain of McBain, Tucson, AZ, Hereditary Chief of Clan McBain as the two are honored. Several authors were also honored; Diana Gabaldon, renowned Flagstaff author whose new book entitled *A Breath of Snow and Ashes* will be out in September; Billie Jan McIntosh, author of *Ah-Ko=Kee, American Sovereign, Biographical Narrative 1818-1868*. The Wallaces of Mesa, Phoenix, Tucson and Prescott all gathered at the unique Flagstaff Games for a weekend of camaraderie, food, bagpipes, games, and dog shows. Often we don't know the impact that our Clan Tent has on visitors. One visitor expressed her excitement of seeing Clan Wallace represented and told Bill of her upcoming wedding where everyone in the wedding party would be wearing Highland attire. It was so exiting to hear the reaction from two ladies the following day at our campground. They had never been to a Scottish Festival and were fascinated. One lady, in tears, said she had 'found family' for the first time in years. Seeing and

hearing their enthusiasm made us acutely aware that The Clan Tent was accomplishing its goal, making all the work worthwhile.

### 24<sup>th</sup> Annual New Brunswick Highland Games & Scottish Festival

Editor Tom E.S. Wallace attended Atlantic Canada's premiere Scottish festival that took place 22-24 July 2005. The opening event was a reception at the vice-regal residence hosted by Lieutenant Governor Herménégilde Chiasson, Queen Elizabeth's official representative in New Brunswick. The reception was followed by an open-air Scottish concert on the grounds. One of the largest Canadian Scottish festivals, the New Brunswick Games filled the grounds of Old Government House with a pageant of color, music and activity. It is reported that 8,000 visitors were in attendance in 2005, with 24 visitors signing the Clan Wallace guest book. Tom's daughter Kathryn, age 5, participated in her first sanctioned Highland Dance Competition, placing 7<sup>th</sup> amongst the Beginners class. Lisa Wallace and John Cobham of Saint John, NB, acted as convenors, with Tom supervising. Tom also represented the Federation of Scottish Clans in Nova Scotia, as he is also 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice President of that organization. The Federation will be hosting the International Gathering of the Clans in Halifax, NS, in 2007.

### 12th Annual Loch Norman Highland Games

One of the best and biggest of the East Coast Games and Festivals each year are those held at Loch Norman at Huntersville, North Carolina in mid-April. This event is sponsored by the Catawba Valley Scottish Society, which boasts of about 250 members, conducted this festival and other heritage related projects during the year as part of their mission. This year there were 82 Clans and Societies represented on the field and thousands of
